- 1 Collect Your Computer Account**
 You can collect your computer account at webkonto.student.hig.se two week before the semester starts. Your computer account consists of a username and a password and gives you access to the University web services.

Course Organisation

This is an independent course. Its five modules will be taught as follows: "Language Structure" and "Written Communication" will be taught in parallel in the first part of the term (weeks 36-45 or period 1); in the second half of the term (weeks 46-03), you will study "Contemporary Literature in English" in parallel with "Culture, Ethnicity, and Identity", and "World English". These are called modules for administrative purposes, but, since they cover quite different areas, are taught by different lecturers, and are assigned a number of credits each, they enjoy a certain degree of autonomy, which justifies referring to them as "courses", in everyday speech. Having said that, please remember that you must complete the entire course "English" and get its 30 credits in order to move on to the next course in English, in the spring term of 2017.

In two of the modules (Language Structure and Written Communication), you will study together with students enrolled in the Teacher Training Program. The first five weeks of the module Contemporary Literature in English will also be studied together with the teacher trainees.

Language Structure ends with a written exam on the HiG campus, but, consistent with the principles of continuous assessment, most of the modules feature compulsory written assignments (*examinerande uppgifter*) throughout their respective periods. More information about the content and assessment procedures for individual modules will be published by the instructors on the course site on Blackboard (see "Communication" below). Attendance of all campus classes is strongly recommended. Learning is a process, and missing classes or not doing one's work as scheduled seriously impairs one's learning and overall performance. All of the five modules include student participation in their assessment procedures. The teaching usually consists of lectures and seminars, but each module has its own structure and policy with respect to the forms of teaching. For example, Written Communication has virtually no lectures, given its focus on writing practice, while Contemporary Literature in English features a mixture of lectures and seminars.

You should order all your course books in good time. A good idea is to get hold of the books indicated in the syllabus (*kursplan*) during the summer vacation. Only a selection of all the titles included in the bibliography for the module "Contemporary Literature in English" will be studied this term. Those texts are: Joseph Conrad's *Heart of Darkness*, Chinua Achebe's *Things Fall Apart*, Mark Haddon's *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time*, Alice Walker's *The Color Purple*, Anita Desai's short story "Scholar and Gypsy" from her volume *Games at Twilight*, Amy Tan's *The Joy Luck Club*, Frank McCourt's *Angela's Ashes*, and David Malouf's *Remembering Babylon*. **In order to reduce your workload during the second period of this term, I strongly recommend that you start reading the novels before the module starts.**

Since this course runs at 100%, you must be prepared to allocate 40 hours of study per week, including class attendance, reading, and writing assignments. Studying for 30 credits in one term is like a full-time job.

Communication

On Blackboard, you will find specific information, such as detailed course descriptions, class schedule, teaching materials, course requirements and assignments. A great part of your work will be carried out via Blackboard, too. It is therefore essential that you enroll in the course on Blackboard as soon as you have been assigned a student account (keep in mind that course registration and enrollment in the course on Blackboard are separate things). Follow the steps under the heading "Get started with your studies". Once the module has started, **you should check the course site on Blackboard on a daily basis.** Important information will be posted by your instructors on the first page of the course site (as "Announcements"). I also strongly recommend that you use your HiG student e-mail account rather than your private e-mail account when communicating with your teachers.

Registration for Written Exams

Registration for exams as well as retakes via KronoX is mandatory. You can register no earlier than five weeks before and no later than ten days before the exam. Please note that no post-registrations will be accepted. If you are a distant education student and are unable to sit the exam at campus you can apply to sit the exam at another location. Applications must be submitted no later than three weeks prior to the exam. Contact your faculty for more information.
